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47 Meconopsis 'Slieve Donard' (AGM)

Background: In about 1935, Dr Curle of Edinburgh crossed M. baileyi. (then known as M. betonicifolia) with M. grandis ssp. grandis and succeeded in raising several seedlings, one of which was subsequently introduced to Slieve Donard nursery in Northern Ireland, whence it acquired its name. The name was later changed to M x sheldonii 'Slieve Donard', the epithet x sheldonii reflecting its hybridity and parentage. IBG, MG8. Notable features: Flowers: Sky-blue, with broadly overlapping petals and with a prominent long and slender style, merging gradually into a rather slender stigma. Emerging leaves: Rosettes, noticeably upright and slender, covered with long, white-tipped hairs. Suffusion with redpurple pigmentation is usually absent. Mature leaves: Elliptical with marginal teeth absent or minute. Fruit capsule: Slender and ellipsoid, with long, slightly white-tipped, spreading bristles. Flowering season: Mid-season. Compare: M. 'Bobby Masterton', 'P.C. Abildgaard', 'John Mitchell' and 'Ormswell'. Availability and cultivation: Specialist nurseries, quite widely available; outstanding sterile cultivar, easily propagated by division.
